Who Came First?

Use the Ordinal numbers on this page and the animals on the next to play a game of "Who Came First?" The goal is to get your child to use ordinal numbers naturally. Chose the correct amount for your child. First exposure, just use 1st-5th. Need more practice, use all the way up to 10th!


Lay the animals in a line and ask, "who is 5th?" and have your child place the 5th card with that animal {continue with all numbers}. You can use this in many different ways. Try a describing game too, "I am thinking of an animal who has a long neck and is tall, he's 3rd...what is he?". You can play hide and seek...hide the animals and then as your child finds them he lines them up in order. Then match the ordinal numbers to his line.

Anything to help your child work on ordinal numbers in a fun way!




Who Came First?

Cut out the animals and glue in the proper box. Use this to discuss comparing sizes. Grab some real objects in your home and help your child put them in size order.






Color or Dot Paint the Crocodiles








Literacy Connection ~ Sequencing

Pocket Chart printables can be used in a pocket chart or just simply laid on the floor or table. Print pages on cardstock, laminate and then cut apart into strips. Use the book along with the strips to put the story back in order!

Story sequencing is an important skill in the early years and greatly helps with comprehension. Use these to work on putting the story back in order and also to work on reading with expression!

Comprehension Connection

Use the following questions as you read, or after to improve comprehension. Make up your own questions too! Cut them out and make a game out of it. Put the cards in a bag or basket and have your child choose one to answer! If s/he is confused, turn to find the answer in the book, showing how to reread for better understanding!

Why were there no animals in the river in the beginning of the story?	Why was the crocodile groaning?	What did the other animals do when they heard crocodile groaning?
Who finally helped crocodile?	What was wrong with crocodile?	Why do you think the animals were all happy in the river at the end?


Use the animals on the next page to create a river scene. Or, if your child likes to draw, have him/her draw their river scene! If you can do some research about river life, even better!


