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These printables were created with a younger reader in mind.

Older readers CAN use these too, but children who are younger when they show an interest in learning to read should enjoy many of these activities.

Please remember not to force a younger reader...just follow the lead of your child.

You do NOT need to use all of the options, choose the ones your child will enjoy. Frustrating a young child will only lead to your own frustration!! One child will love word searches, one will hate them. Figure out what your child likes and only use those. I include many options for this reason ~ knowing all children are different!

- © You Can Read Use this either as a cover if you plan to make a booklet, or as a final certificate when your child masters these words.
- © Color/Trace the Words If you want flashcards, print these on cardstock and either color yourself or have your child color the letters. Laminate and then cut them out to use throughout the unit and for review. If your child is ready for tracing, use that set either instead of or in addition to the Color the Words set. Use a set for your Word Wall is you are using one!
- © Building Words Print on cardstock, laminate and cut the letters apart. Use these for word building. A mini table pocket chart works great for this activity.
- © Play Doh Words Have your child use <u>play doh</u> to form the letters of the words. You can slide these into a <u>sheet protector</u> to avoid having to laminate. If you plan to use for review, I would laminate and cut them apart for a complete set.
- © Play Doh Words...page 2
- Word Puzzles...Print the puzzles and cut apart the pieces. Use the 2nd sheet{blank with just light kid images} as a base for the puzzles. I would <u>laminate</u> these if possible.
- © Word BINGO Use these mats, either cut apart or as is to play BINGO. Call out a sight word and have your child use a dry erase marker {if <u>laminated</u>} or a small item to find the word. Each word is listed twice, mark only one at a time.
- © Word BINGO extra boards if needed

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- Tracing Have your child read the word aloud and then trace the line to connect the word to the matching word.
- © Word Shapes Have your child connect the dots between the matching words to form a shape. If your child isn't able to connect dots yet you can draw the lines for him/her as s/he points out the matching words for you. Identify the shapes made when complete.
- @ Mixed Up Fonts Have your child use the four colors {dry erase if laminated} to circle each sight word written in different fonts.
- © Word Search The words are ONLY listed the way a young child would read them {left to right) one word per row to make it easier. Have your child circle or highlight each word.
- Sentence Search Have your child color or circle each sight word as you read the sentences aloud.
- Writing Practice This should only be used by children who are ready for this. If writing frustrates your younger child, have him/her watch as you write the words using a dry erase marker {with the sheet in a protector}.
- Color by Word Use the color guide to have your child color each book the correct color. If your child likes to color s/he can color the rest of the picture, if not-don't force it! That's why I just included the books, to make it simple for younger kids who aren't as into coloring! If your child does not know color words, circle them in the appropriate color before your child begins.

After your child works with these 4 words and you feel s/he is confident in recognizing these words, here are a few activities to try...

- Go on a word hunt using some of your child's favorite picture books {not easy readers...use normal picture books you enjoy reading to your child}. Have him/her find a certain word while you are reading. Some kids will love this, some won't. For those that do not enjoy this, only have them find a word a few times instead of on every page.
- Use Education Cubes to play an active game such as this example from my blog. Use these 4 new words and any words learned up until this unit.
- Create an "I Can Read" basket and include easy readers your child is confident reading independently. We use many books from this list, with Bob being my son's favorites!
- Create a Word Wall for your child and add the new words to the wall. See photos of our word walls here.
- Use a dry erase board for the following fun ideas...
 - Write any sight words your child knows and then have him/her erase the word you call out.
 - Have your child write the words on a dry erase board, either on his/her own or tracing over your writing.
 - Write a word on the board and challenge your child to yell it out quickly!
